The Community Mapper provides a quick, fun and effective way to create your own map of community issues and opportunities.

Conduct a DIY (do it yourself) workshop with neighbors, friends or businesses. The DIY kit contains all the information you need to conduct your own workshop with neighbors, friends and colleagues. Just call 708.358.5418 or stop by Village Hall, 123 Madison St. to pick up a kit. The workshop conversation can take as little as one hour — or you can discuss things as long as you want. Be creative. Organize your book club, knitting circle or prayer group. Have an indoor block party and share your thoughts about Oak Park's

future. Organize your school PTO or nonprofit board so your cause can be part of the plan. Once complete, simply return the results to the Village. Everything you need is in the DIY Kit.

Participate in the February Vision Kick-Off. Outreach events to date have focused on identifying issues and opportunities. In February, we will begin to focus on establishing a vision for the future of Oak Park. Coyotes a part of Oak Park life



ith an estimated 30,000 coyotes currently living in Illinois, like it or not, coyotes are a permanent fixture in Oak Park. Seeing a coyote does not necessarily mean a dangerous situation for humans or domestic animals. If approached by a coyote, do not run make yourself appear larger by yelling, standing up straight, clapping your hands and waving your arms. You can even throw something at the coyote. Your actions not only will scare the coyote, but will discourage it from approaching humans in the future. In the unlikely event that a coyote is aggressive or shows its fangs, growls or approaches,

get to safety and contact the Animal Control Division at 708.358.5680 to provide details including the date, time and address of the event. In the meantime, discourage coyotes from being attracted to your property by following these tips:

- Do not feed coyotes. This means limiting unintentional outdoor food sources like pet food and ripe fruit. Bird food, for example, attracts rodents which coyotes feed upon.
- Do not leave small pets especially cats unattended outside.
- Consider installing a fence at least four feet high to prevent coyotes from entering your yard.
- Keep garbage stored securely. While coyotes are not likely to eat garbage, they may be to be attracted to the rodents that feed on it.

Village retains high fire prep rating

The Village has retained its high ranking from the Insurance Services Office, an independent organization that evaluates communities' fire preparedness capabilities. After examining the Village's Fire Department, alarm and dispatch facilities, and water supply, Oak Park earned a rating of 2 on the Public Protection Classification (PPC) scale. The PPC scale is a 1–10 rating system, with 1 being the highest possible

grading. Excellent PPC ratings result in lower fire losses, which enable insurance companies to offer fair premiums for

homeowners and commercial properties. Insurers also use PPC ratings for marketing and underwriting. Communities with a good PPC score typically enjoy lower prices for fire insurance, compared to communities with lesser ratings. ISO evaluates about 2,400 fire departments in Illinois. Forecast key to planning parking when it snows

The Village has specific rules that govern parking when it snows — rules that are enforced seven days a week, including holidays. Residents are urged to monitor local forecasts and plan accordingly. When a snow emergency is declared by the Public Works Department, all parking is prohibited on



the main streets posted as snow routes. Parking on other streets is restricted to one side from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. in residential areas and from midnight to 8 a.m. in

designated commercial districts, the side determined by the odd/even date. To find out if snow-related parking restrictions are in effect, call 708.358. SNOW (708.358.7669) for a recorded message. Sidewalk shoveling required

roperty owners who shovel their sidewalks are doing more than making it safer for pedestrians of all ages, they are complying with the law. Village ordinance requires snow and ice to be removed from the public sidewalk within 24 hours following any snow, sleet or freezing rain. Being a good neighbor is important, too, so property owners are urged to help those who may need help clearing a sidewalk.


New recycling programs in the works

- Organics The compostable food scrap pilot program tested in one collection
 route will be expanded Village wide in the spring. Sign-up will begin in February,
 with cart deliveries in March. Collections likely will begin the first full week of April.
 The cost will be \$14 per month, in addition to the regular collection rates, but also
 includes yard waste, which can be comingled with the compostables. Residents
 can reduce costs by downsizing refuse carts or sharing compost carts with
 neighbors.
- Unused medications A Keep Illinois Beautiful grant will be used to purchase a
 secure container to collect unused and expired medications in the lobby of the
 Police Department in Village Hall, 123 Madison St. The Illinois Environmental
 Protection Agency will collect and dispose of the medications. The Village also is
 investigating a program that would add a separate locked collection container for
 sharp items such as hypodermic needles.
- Carpet The Village is exploring the feasibility of implementing a drop-off collection program for carpeting. Two recycling companies have contacted the Village to discuss their programs. More details will be provided as they become available.

Refuse hauling rates increase

eginning Jan. 1, the cost for a 96-gallon refuse cart is \$21.38, up from \$21.15, and the cost for a 64-gallon refuse cart is \$18.10, up from \$17.90. Refuse rates are charged on quarterly water bills. Green yard waste stickers are now \$2.36, up from \$2.35. Pink bulk-item refuse stickers remain \$2. Down payment assistance...The West Cook County Housing Collaborative is making homeownership more affordable with \$10,000 in down payment assistance for select updated and rehabbed homes. Financing and supply of homes is limited. To apply, call the HUD-certified West Cook Homeownership Center at 708.771.5801. An application also is available online at www.WestCookHomeownership.org.



Energy, water efficiency rebates...A new Village program funded by the Oak Park River Forest Community Foundation will offer rebates to help homeowners reduce energy waste and use. The new Energy and Water Efficiency Rebate Program will offer \$50 to approximately 50 single-family households to conduct an energy audit and \$100 to 100 households to install low-flow toilets. Another 250 households will receive free efficient shower heads and faucet aerators. For details, call 708.358.5410 or e-mail housing@oak-park.us.

Multi-family rehab loans...Owners of multi-family buildings with seven or fewer units may be eligible for forgivable loans of up to \$5,000 per unit and an additional \$2,500 per unit for qualified energy upgrades under the Village's Small Rental Rehab Program. First-time homebuyer seminars...Individuals interested in learning more about buying a home and securing a mortgage are invited to attend free seminars offered every month by the Oak Park Regional Housing Center. Seminars are held at 7 p.m., the fourth Tuesday of each month in Village Hall, 123 Madison St. The next seminar is Tues., Jan. 22. For more information, call 708.771.5801.

Single-family rehab loans...Loans are available to income-eligible residents to correct health and safety issues and building code violations in their single-family homes. The program offers no-interest loans of up to \$25,000 that do not require monthly payments. Loans are repayable after 20 years or when the property is transferred. Call 708.358.5410 or e-mail housing@oak-park.us for more information.

Funds for efficiency updates...Oak Park homeowners are eligible for a program that helps pay for upgrades to cut heating and cooling costs by improving energy efficiency. Property owners pay \$99 for an energy assessment to identify energy saving upgrades and then Energy Impact Illinois will pay a portion of the cost for the upgrades — as much as \$1,750. Officials say homeowners can save an average of \$500 per year on energy bills after upgrades such as retrofitting insulation and sealing air leaks. Multi-family matching grants... Applications for the Multi-Family Housing Incentives Matching Grant program will be accepted beginning in mid-January. Village to participate in Green Cities Community Challenge

ak Parkers who sign up for and link their utility bills to a free online energy-use tracking tool can help the Village earn up to \$25,000 for community projects, as well as receive free energy assessments and rebates for efficiency improvements. The tracking tool — EnergyBUZZ — is part of the Nicor Gas Community Challenge, which offers access to a range of programs for residential, multi-family and business properties. While homes and businesses can receive free energy assessments and rebates for energy efficiency improvements, apartment building owners can receive free faucet aerators, showerheads, light bulbs and programmable thermostats. Oak Park and Evanston are the first two communities to participate in the challenge. Officials say that while energy efficiency helps families and businesses make ends meet, improvements also benefit the community by putting more money into people's pockets to spend at area businesses, contributing to the local economy and job growth. 
Cable television is not the only way to watch VOP-TV, Oak Park's official government television station. In addition to streaming live Village

Warming centers open

CPR classes offered

The Oak Park Fire Department offers a variety of life-saving classes including CPR and training in how to use an automated external defibrillator, or AED. Classes are held from 6 – 10 p.m. at the Department's certified American Heart Association community training center in the main fire station, 100 N. Euclid Ave. All courses are taught by an AHA-certified instructor. Classes are \$25 for Oak Park residents and \$50 for non-residents, in addition to a \$12 textbook fee. Efforts underway to reduce obesity

pepresentatives of non-profit and nrivate sector organizations have joined Village government in a cooperative effort to reduce the debilitating



health effects of obesity. Under the banner Wild About Wellness. the initiative is advocating a

series of community-wide policy changes designed to increase physical activity and encourage nutritious eating by children, teens and adults of all ages. The goal, officials say, is to build healthier environments and an infrastructure that will reverse the serious epidemic of obesity. Wild About Wellness is part of Oak Park's Pioneering Healthier Communities (PHC) initiative, a national program created by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to focus community resources on changing the environment in ways that reduce community barriers to healthy living. Oak Park is one

of 16 communities in Illinois, Michigan and Ohio that are building statewide networks to reduce obesity. The West Cook YMCA was the catalyst to launch and secure funding. According to national sources, the medical cost of obesity in the U.S. is estimated at \$270 billion annually and contributes to heart disease, diabetes, asthma, arthritis, cancer and depression. Among the goals of the Oak Park Pioneering Healthier Communities team are to:

- Increase community activities that promote healthy eating
- Encourage families to provide healthy food to children
- Align after-school programs with the new physical education standards
- Move children to walk or bike to school
- · Reduce one-mile car rides within the community
- Increase fresh fruit and vegetable options for pre- and school-aged children. For more information on the program, e-mail health@oak-park.us.

Tree pruning scheduled

ree pruning is scheduled from early January to mid-March, weather permitting. The 2013 trim area is between Chicago Avenue and Division Street, from Austin Boulevard to East Avenue and North Boulevard to Chicago, from Austin to Harlem Avenue. Forestry Division employees will be pruning parkway trees 10 inches in diameter and under. Private contractor Winkler Tree Service, working under the supervision of the Forestry Division, will prune trees more than 10 inches in diameter, Approximately 1,500 trees will be trimmed by Village crews and 3,000 trees will be trimmed by the contractor.
