New approach aims to strengthen community policing program

ak Park Police are launching a new initiative to enhance and strengthen the popular Resident Beat Officer (RBO) program by expanding the pool of potential candidates beyond just residents.

Called the Neighborhood Resource Officer Program, this new initiative will ensure citizens in each of the Village's eight designated policing zones always will have an officer assigned to address community livability issues within their specific beats.

When the RBO program was created more than two decades ago, RBO candidates were required not only to reside in the Village, but live within the geographic area they would serve.

This requirement was not an issue in the early days of the program when most Oak Park police officers were residents.

Neighborhood Policing Zones



Today, the majority of Oak Park police officers live outside the community. which significantly limits the number of officers eligible to apply to be RBOs. Three vacancies exist currently in the RBO program.

As officers have transitioned out of the RBO program due to promotion and reassignment, positions have become increasingly difficult to fill within the program's strict residency requirements.

The goal of the new program, police say, is to offer any officer on the force an opportunity to apply to be assigned to one of the eight neighborhood zones when vacancies arise.

Officers who live in Oak Park will, of course, be urged to apply under the existing requirements of the RBO program. And those RBOs already on the job will continue to serve their neighborhoods.

Officials view the new program as a necessary evolution of the basic RBO concept that will make sure no zone is without an assigned officer just because of the residency requirement.

Neighborhood Resource Officers, or NROs, will perform the essential duties of RBOs. Working directly with members of the community, they will develop problem-solving policing solutions, monitor crime trends and

engage in community outreach efforts such as community meetings.

Recruitment of candidates for the open policing zones already is underway, as police officials move quickly to fill vacancies and prepare for future staffing needs.

911 registry for special needs

Oak Parkers with special needs that should be considered in an emergency situation can register with the Village to ensure first responders are aware when dispatched via a 911 call. Knowing that they are being sent to a home where someone may have a hearing or visual impairment, mobility limitation, cognitive impairment or uses an electrically powered medical device could prove vital to emergency medical personnel. The Village passed a local Human Rights Ordinance the same year and continues to be committed to encouraging diversity and integration. Over the past year the Village and its housing partners have been working to increase coordination and revamp the annual rental housing management seminar curriculum with more information on fair housing. Free marketing support offered to landlords



s part of the Village's commitment to fair housing, grants and rental reimbursements are available to multifamily rental building owners who agree to market their units in ways that encourage diversity. The Multi-Family Housing Incentives Program offers matching grants of up to \$10,000 and rental reimbursement to buildings with a history of marketing difficulties. The program is designed for buildings with four or more units and requires agreeing to allow the Oak Park Regional Housing Center to market vacant units for one year. Applications are evaluated by Village

Farmers' Market seeking volunteers



Rehab loans available for single-family, small rental properties

Single-family homes – No interest loans of up to \$25,000 are available to incomeeligible households to correct health and safety issues and building code violations. No monthly payments are required. Loans are repayable after 20 years or when the property is transferred.

Rental properties – Rental properties with fewer than eight units may be eligible for forgivable loans of up to \$5,000 per unit for projects such as property repairs, unit upgrades and energy efficiency improvements. Owners must contribute matching funds of at least 25 percent of the total project cost and agree to rent to incomeeligible tenants for two years.



Officials assess demographic trends

Perpesentatives of Oak Park's six taxing bodies recently bored deep into a snapshot of community demographics from 2000 to 2010. A presentation by the Village included details on housing, incomes, transportation costs, employment status and other factors that can affect public policy strategies that serve both current and

perspective residents. The gathering was the third annual InterGovernmental Assembly — or iGov — where elected officials and senior staff share information, discuss potential collaborative opportunities and talk about present and future challenges. Highlights of the presentation on demographics included data showing that the



senior population increased both numerically and as a percentage of population. Oak Park's racial diversity has grown as well, including a sizeable increase in residents who identify as Hispanic or Latino. Analysis of the data also confirmed that mixed use and multi-family rental developments under construction and in review could go a long way toward meeting current demand. In addition, the presentation included data showing that foreclosure filings have slowed dramatically since their peak in 2011. When permits are required...

ost construction projects, both large and small, require a permit issued by the Village. Constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, moving, demolishing or changing occupancy of a building or structure requires a permit. So does erecting,



installing, enlarging, altering, repairing, removing, converting or replacing any electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing systems. The permit application process is a system of checks and balances. Larger jobs involve a minimum of five people to ensure the safest and highest quality project possible. A professional architect licensed by the state draws the plans, a certified plans examiner reviews

the plans, a registered and insured contractor builds to the approved plans and professional certified staff inspects the work to ensure it is done properly. Zoning workshops planned

he Plan Commission is preparing for public meetings and open houses to discuss the status of the first comprehensive review of Village zoning regulations since 2002. Drafts of recommended changes should be ready for public discussion in late April, as efforts focus on revisions to better align local laws with recommendations in Envision Oak Park, the community's long-range comprehensive plan adopted last vear. Camiros Ltd., a Chicago-based planning and zoning firm, was selected through a competitive process early in 2015 to lead the zoning project. The goal, project planners say, is to help make Oak Park a more sustainable, livable and business-friendly community. The proposed Madison Street Zoning District was approved by the Village Board in February 2016. A formal public hearing will be held before the Village Board considers revisions to the full zoning code sometime in late-summer. In the meantime, property owners can learn more about the project and follow its progress via a dedicated website at www.oakparkzoning.com, where presentations and reports are posted and public comments accepted. News for Renters

Discrimination complaints...Village Code defends the rights of individuals within the protected classes of race, sex, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, veteran status, sexual orientation, age, marital status, familial status or disability in the purchasing, leasing, securing a loan, renting or occupying housing or other real estate. Interest rates on security deposits... Tenants of apartment buildings containing four or more units are entitled to interest on their security deposits. Interest must be paid or applied toward rent within 30 days of the expiration of each 12-month period. The security deposit must have been held for at least six months and the rent must be current to be eligible for interest. Call 708.358.5407 or email community@oak-park.us for more information.

Early voting for the March 15 Presidential Primary Election will be offered at Village Hall, 123 Madison St. through March 14. Yard waste collection begins

ollection of yard waste will begin April 4. Bundled brush no larger than two feet in diameter and four feet in length and yard waste such as grass clippings, leaves, shrubs and vines will be picked up on regular refuse collection days. A green yard waste sticker must be attached to each brush bundle, 32-gallon paper bag and rigid container. Stickers are \$2.45 each. Residents are urged to look for alternatives to bagging yard waste such as mulching mowers, leaf shredders or backyard compost piles.
