Free holiday parking to help support shopping

Shoppers who come upon a bagged meter in downtown Oak Park or in the vicinity of South Oak Park Avenue are in luck. They can park free for two hours.

The new program, which begins after Thanksgiving, will let anyone park free for two hours at a meter or in a pay-by-space lot on Saturdays before Dec. 25. Parking always is free on Sunday.

The program is intended as a thank you for residents and visitors who shop locally. Retail sales benefit not only local retailers, but the entire Village since 2 percent of every retail sale comes back to municipal coffers to fund vital public services.

For many retailers, the holiday season is the most important time of the year. In approving the new program, the Village Board said they hope this small gesture will increase sales as well as create goodwill among the businesses and their customers.

The new free Saturday parking program will become a fixture every year after Thanksgiving through the Saturday before Dec. 25. The Village Board had previously approved free garage parking for the same period.

This latest change to local law that created the free weekend parking also made parking free in garages and in these shopping areas on July 4.

Keeping an Eye on the Ike as reconstruction plans evolve

The Village of Oak Park is keeping its *Eye on the Ike*, as the Illinois Department of Transportation prepares for the largest major reconstruction of I-290 since it forever transformed the community more than five decades ago.

With the potential for both positive and negative impacts on the community, Village efforts are focused on helping residents stay informed and get involved in the planning process to ensure the negatives are minimized and opportunities maximized.

Actual funding and construction may still be several years off, but the state is only about a year away from choosing its preferred plan. That's why the Village is working to make sure residents get the latest news and take advantage of every opportunity to influence IDOT decisions.


A page on the Village website — www.oak-park.us/eyeontheike — has been created as a clearinghouse for the latest information, such as dates and times of formal hearings hosted by the IDOT to gather public input, and links to studies and presentations.


In addition, the Village Board is actively calling on residents to get involved. The Board hosted a community meeting at Lincoln School in September, and State Sen. Don Harmon was scheduled to bring Illinois Transportation Secretary Ann Schneider to Gwendolyn Brooks Middle School in October to hear from the community. More local meetings are likely as IDOT moves closer to a final plan.

State transportation planners have narrowed the options to four for reconstructing I-290 from Racine Avenue to Mannheim Road. Each would widen the Ike through Oak Park from six to eight lanes and move the exit and entrance ramps to the right side of the expressway at Harlem Avenue and Austin Boulevard.

The elevated ramps would be well above grade along much of Harrison and Garfield Streets, a concept many say could pose the biggest negative impact on the community, bringing noise and pollution out of the current highway trench closer to the nearby neighborhoods.

But IDOT's plans also offer potential opportunities for improved pedestrian and bicycle access to upgraded CTA

stations and even expanded space on the new bridge decks for amenities such as bike racks, landscaping and new retail activity.

In addition, opportunities may arise to get transportation planners to look beyond a wider highway as the only solution to improving I-290 traffic flow. Many residents support improving the Blue Line and extending it further westward as part of a broader plan to reduce traffic congestion.

So what can you do? The most important steps residents can take are to stay informed and ask questions. Residents also are urged to check the Village website for updates, sign up for Village e-news alerts, watch our Facebook page and follow us on Twitter. Most importantly, residents need to tell the Village what they think by emailing questions or concerns to village@oak-park.us.

Fire Department offers range of safety information

Emergency response volunteers sought

Jolunteers now are being sought to form a community emergency response team — or CERT — that would support response efforts after an emergency or natural disaster. Working with the Police, Fire, Public Works and Public Health departments, Oak Park's CERT will provide not only required assistance, but the leadership and organization ability that can help fill the gap between the number of people who need emergency assistance and the resources available within the community and their own neighborhoods. CERT members will learn basic firefighting, search and rescue, communications, traffic control and other emergency response skills. Fall leaf collection continues

The annual fall leaf collection program will continue through the week of Dec. 2. Leaves should be raked into the street at least 18 inches from the curb the day before the scheduled pickup dates, which are determined by location indicated on the map. Residents who miss a scheduled pickup date are urged to keep leaves on the parkway until the night before the next scheduled pickup. Cooperation is essential to the success of the program, so please follow these simple rules:

- Leaves only do not add brush, tree branches, grass clippings or yard waste.
- Do not park on or near a pile of leaves, which can hinder leaf removal.
- Rake leaves onto side streets whenever possible, avoiding major thoroughfares where piles of leaves might create traffic hazards.
- Do not rake leaves into or close to cul-de-sacs or traffic diverters. The equipment needs room to operate.
- Keep catch basins clear of raked leaves to avoid localized flooding.
- Dampen piles after raking to avoid wind-blown leaves.
- Consider alternatives to raking such as composting or using leaves as garden mulch.
- Inform landscape services of the leaf collection schedule.
- Be sure to obey all parking restrictions don't risk a citation.
- Drive carefully leaves are slippery when wet and large piles may hinder visibility.

Carbon monoxide detectors required by law

n investment of about \$30 for a detector can be the difference in life and death when it comes to deadly carbon monoxide, an odorless and tasteless gas that can leak into one's home from a malfunctioning gas appliance, such as a furnace or water heater. Because it is impossible to see, taste or smell the toxic fumes, CO can kill you before you are aware it is in your home. That's why state law requires homeowners and landlords to install carbon monoxide detectors within 15 feet of every room used for sleeping. Alarms can be battery powered, plug-in with battery backup or wired into the AC power line with a secondary battery backup. The alarm can be combined with a smoke detector if the combined unit complies with established standards and the alarm differentiates the hazard. The property owner must supply and install all required alarms. Landlords must ensure that alarms are operable on the date a lease is initiated. While tenants are responsible for testing and maintaining the alarm after the lease commences, landlords must provide written instructions. Carbon monoxide detectors are not substitutes for smoke detectors, fire officials caution, so both devices are essential. For more information, call 708.358.5600 or email fire@oak-park.us.

Regular yard waste collection ends... After Fri., Nov. 29, yard waste will be collected only by appointment. Call Waste Management at 888.656.5350 to arrange a special pick-up.

Be cautious with alternate heat sources...When using heat sources such as portable and baseboard electric heaters, fireplaces and woodstoves, remove nearby objects, keep furniture a safe distance away, do not block the heat flow and never use an extension cord. Working carbon monoxide detectors, smoke alarms and a family escape plan also are essential. Call 708.358.5600 or email fire@oak-park.us for more information.

Winter refuse collection...Residents and building owners are reminded to clear snow away from refuse and recycling containers to avoid a missed collection. If the container is not accessible, it will not be emptied. Call 708.358.5700 to report a missed collection.

Pay water bill online...Property owners can pay their water bills electronically, either by using a credit card online, or setting up an automatic debit from a checking, savings or credit card account. Property owners also can go paperless by signing up to receive bills via email. In addition to water, the quarterly bill includes charges for sewer, garbage disposal and recycling. Avoid frozen pipes...When the temperature dips below freezing, let your water trickle from faucets, especially those connected to pipes near or on outside walls. If you are having water problems, call 708.358.5700 before calling a plumber.

Pet responsibilities...Dog owners are required to pick up and dispose of dog waste. Owners walking their dogs must carry a bag or other suitable means to pick up dog waste. Call 708.358.5680 to register a complaint about an animal, such as noise, excrement, cruelty or off leash.

> Recycle holiday lights...Residents can recycle unwanted holiday lights and extension cords from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. in December and January at the Public Works Center, 201 South Blvd. Mini, rope, LED, C7 and C9 lights will be accepted. Call 708.358.5700 or email publicworks@oak-park.us for details.

Stop solicitors...To prevent door-to-door solicitors from knocking on your door, obtain a No Soliciting sticker from the Office of the Village Clerk, 123 Madison St. Place the sticker on or near your front door. Snowfall triggers emergency parking restrictions

After a two-inch snowfall, the Emergency Snow Removal Parking Plan goes into effect and the following parking rules are enforced seven days a week, including holidays:

- Main streets posted as snow routes must be cleared of all parked cars.
 These include Augusta, Austin, Chicago, Division, Garfield, Harlem, Harrison, Jackson, Lake, Madison, North Ave., Oak Park, Ridgeland, Roosevelt and Wisconsin from Madison to the emergency entrance of Oak Park Hospital.
- Non-snow route streets allow parking between 8 a.m. and 10 p.m.
 on the side of the street with even numbered addresses on even days and the side of the street with odd numbered addresses on odd days.
- Designated commercial parking areas as posted follow the odd/even rule between midnight and 8 a.m.
- Snow parking rules do not override other parking regulations, such as time limitations and prohibitions.
- Vehicles parked in violation of the snow restrictions are subject to ticketing and towing.

To find out if snow-related parking restrictions are in effect, call

708.358.7669 for a recorded message. Cable television subscribers can tune into VOP-TV, available on Comcast channel 6 and AT&T channel 99. Residents also can sign up for alerts at www.oak-park.us — just look under the online services tab.

Sidewalk shoveling required

Village ordinance requires snow and ice be removed from the public sidewalk within 24 hours following any snow, sleet or freezing rain. For more information on the shoveling requirement or help resources, call 708.358.5700 or email publicworks@oak-park.us.


Two episodes from the series also were selected to screen at the Chicago International Food Film Festival in November.
